Context

It is a legal requirement under the 1988 Education Reform Act that all maintained schools perform a daily act of collective worship that is wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian nature. As a Catholic school our core aims are to nourish an ethos based on Gospel values of love, wisdom, integrity, justice and compassion. We aim not to merely fulfil our statutory requirement but to develop a Catholic community that is welcoming, caring and inclusive.

Aims

Collective worship at St Augustine of Canterbury offers pupils:

- Silent contemplation, reflection, personal response and prayer. develop an awareness of

- explore shared beliefs reaffirm and put into practice our Catholic ethos

Participation

At St Augustine's we believe that everyone can contribute and gain from their experiences in collective worship, regardless of their level of belief and commitment. Collective Worship provides everyone with the opportunity to gather in support of one another as a community and to share in beliefs and values that unite us in our cohesive community.

The community of St Augustine's is committed to providing a full range of opportunities for all students, regardless of gender, disability, ethnicity, social, cultural or religious background. We recognise that all children should be involved in the daily act of worship unless withdrawn by the parent or guardian and that teachers also have the right of withdrawal from collective worship.

Content and Delivery

The Collective Worship Calendar identifies a weekly theme from our school mission statement and a 'teaching of the week' that permeates through our acts of worship. The liturgical calendar is included in our collective worship resources weekly.

Monitoring and Evaluation

The Chaplain and Head of Religious Education work collaboratively to develop and embed collective worship across the school. This has involved:



- developing a policy of collective worship
- creating a weekly calendar including themes, teachings and liturgical events
- Providing weekly resources for use in form times and assemblies leading on collective

worship during staff gatherings and assemblies arranging special masses and events for key dates

Together the chaplain and head of Religious Education offer support to staff and provide inductions for new staff and ITT.
