OPPORTUNITIES



12th-19th May is National Doughnut Week. Yes, that's right. Doughnuts have their own week. And it's for good reason. Businesses including bakers, coffee shops, and offices take part and sell lots of delicious doughnuts to raise funds for The Children's Trust. So far, £588,344 has been raised.



This week, we're thinking about how many different job roles go into the creation, advertising, sale and charity fundraising of a doughnut to raise money.



The first job role to think about are Bakers. One important thing you need to know about this role is that they work really early mornings to bake their goods to sell for the day. You can expect to earn around £26,000 and work around 40 hours per week.



Baking not really your thing? That's ok! Let's consider the bakery owner who decides to sign up for National Doughnut Week. They may own their business as a Franchise Owner or a Managing Director. They have a lot of responsibility, work long hours and can risk not earning any money if their business doesn't do well. However, if it does do well, they can make LOTS of money! An example of a business owner that has done well is Gym Shark.



In order for the business to do well, the owner will need to invest in marketing. Marketing managers plan how to promote products, services or brands and oversee all marketing activity. You can earn up to £65,000 and work 37 hours per week.



Lastly, the bakery that has signed up to be part of National Doughnut Week would be speaking to a Charity Fundraiser to arrange all the details. Charity fundraisers organise events and activities to encourage people to donate to causes and organisations.

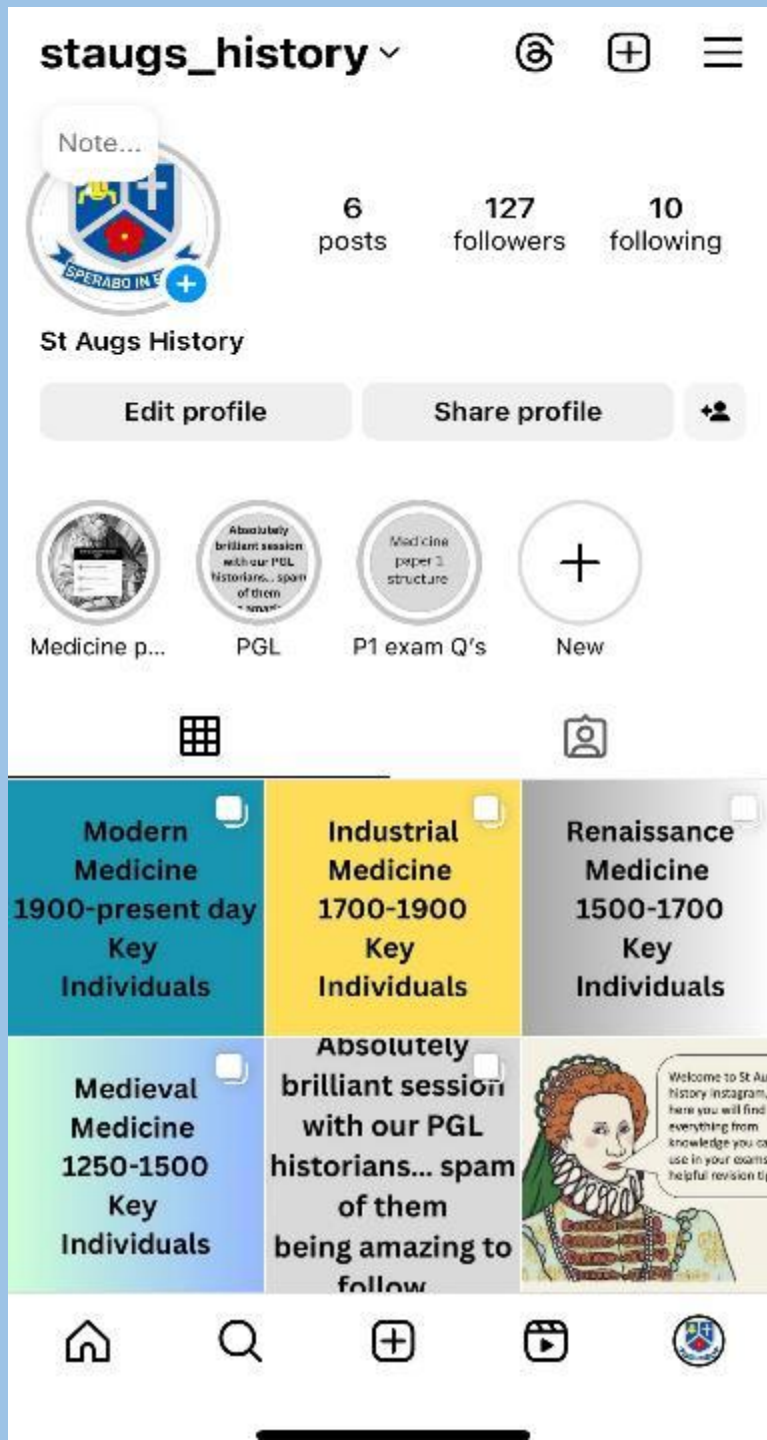

Big Ideas: Underlies the power to transform - Romeo goes from sad to dignified when he meets Juliet. Fate and free will determine people's future - Romeo's impetuosity drives his life rather than fate which he blames. Power's desire for power leads to conflict and death Romeo kills Tybalt seeking power.

Romeo & Juliet - Key Quote
"A pair of star-crossed lovers take their life"
Stated in the prologue, this famous quote reveals the tragic end of our protagonists lives, Romeo and Juliet's death is written in the stars.
The adjective 'star-crossed' immediately suggests that the lovers are destined to meet, fall in love and die together. The Elizabethan audience believed that fate was absolute and so nothing can change this predetermined future for the lovers.
However, the combination of outside is mentioned through the phrase 'star-crossed' suggesting fate will also play a part in their death.
The singular word 'they' confirms that Romeo and Juliet will only truthfully be together once they die.

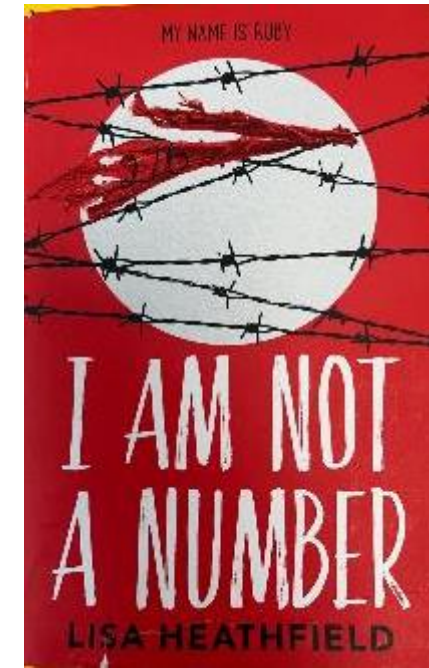
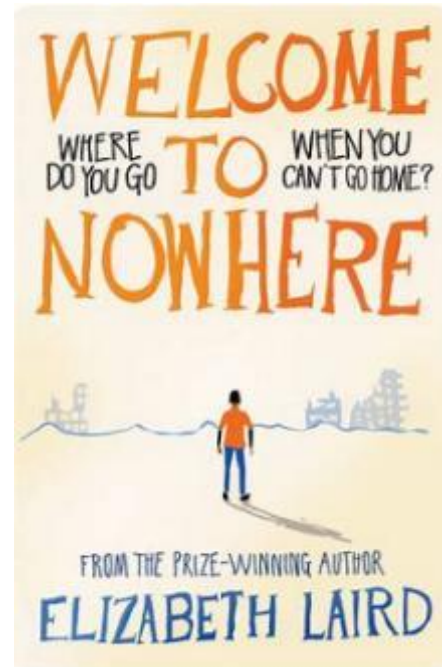

Is it fair to judge others based on first impressions?

An all-girls football team has won a league dominated by boys' teams, after going unbeaten for an entire season. The Queens Park Ladies U12s finished top of their table with eighteen wins in the group of eleven boys' teams. They were the only girls' team in the Bournemouth Youth Football League, playing in its third division for under-12s. The players, who train twice a week, have now proved themselves against the other teams.

Toby Green, who is the girls' manager, said that in order for his team to be allowed to compete in the Bournemouth Youth Football League, he had to appeal the initial instructions. Though league officials told Green they had to play in a girls' league, he insisted his team had the ability to play competitively against boys every week. Why do you think they faced this initial hurdle, and do you think that was fair?





Vital statistics

According to data released by the FA (the Football Association) in 2022, of the over 91,000 girls in England playing team football, less than 13,000 (roughly 14%) play in a mixed-gender environment. Is this figure higher or lower than what you might expect?

A study of 261 international youth players, also in 2022, revealed that a much larger percentage (84%) had played in a mixed-gender environment between the ages of 5 and 16. Share your thoughts on why this figure may be higher outside the UK. Is this what you might expect, and do you think this is changing?
